Care of physical needs

Mercy Needs Committee

In 2017, the Mercy Needs Committee rejoiced in receiving many blessings, but were touched with sadness as well. As in years past, our work was well supported by your exuberant giving, and we sincerely thank all of you who gave to this ministry. One special blessing came last fall in seeing the large outpouring of funds raised by our church for hurricane victims in Florida, Texas and Puerto Rico.

In our local community, we were pleased to assist single mothers, those needing assistance with rent and food supplies, and prisoners needing assistance with clothing, toiletries, stamps and other necessities. Within the church body, members whose health needs impacted their ability to work were also assisted, and need-based financial support and counseling was provided to members struggling financially, or suffering emotional, physical or spiritual struggles.

This year, our congregational outreach ministries were continued, including sending 29 flower arrangements, mailing 81 cards and making 58 phone calls to people facing illnesses, hospital stays, or grieving the loss of loved ones. Also, 102 cards and letters were sent out to those in need of support and encouragement.

In service to our surrounding community, our *Food Pantry* regularly distributed groceries to folks outside the body, while also providing information on local supportive agencies and church brochures. Our pantry is always available to members and regular attendees who are in need. Sally Preece continued in managing, and was assisted by Denise Madden. Thanks to your donations, our pantry was kept well-stocked throughout the year.

Several of your monthly Mercy Needs offerings were designated for support of outside ministries:

May: \$1,505 – PCA Compassion Fund

June: \$652 – PCA Ministerial Relief Fund (for retired pastors and widows of pastors)

September: \$3,286 - Missions to the World (MTW), Mission to North America (MNA), Texas hurricane relief

October: \$581 - MTW/MNA, Florida hurricane relief

November: \$1,646 - MTW/MNA, Puerto Rico hurricane relief

The Merry Martha Ministry was thankful for the opportunity to provide 48 meals this year for those in the congregation who faced limitations due to illness, injury, surgery, birth of a baby, job loss, loss of a loved one, etc. They also kept two meals in the freezer to be used at the pastoral staff's discretion. Functioning as six teams, each responsible for two months of the year, they had 43 members serving as of December. If anyone is aware of a meal need in the congregation, please contact the church office or Debbie Stetson.

The Friends of Liberty list of widows, widowers, single parents, and others in special circumstances, and a listing of our unemployed and underemployed members were prayerfully reviewed, updated and lifted up each month. Most importantly, prayers were offered at each meeting with thanksgiving, worship and requests to God for each person reached out to by our committee.

The sadness we experienced was the departure of three long-serving members of the committee, Doug and Sandy Womer and Joe Leeds. Their presence and spirit is missed by those of us remaining on the committee. We were fortunate to have three others added to the committee.

In the coming year, we plan to update our procedures and literature for food pantry distributions. We hope to re-establish a mechanism to share our faith in the Lord and the gospel message with pantry recipients. We are also excited by new and ongoing mercy-related ministries in our church including the Fill My Cup Ministry, Open Hearts Ministry, and Liberty's benefit concerts.

We encourage the congregation to bring to the attention of any committee member, (Mary Ellen Gannon, Sandy Sunderland, Michael Anderson, Linda Anderson, Jeff Jordan, Mark Fuhrer) any opportunity they see within the body that our committee may address. It is our earnest wish that the Mercy Needs Ministry will bring Glory to our Lord and further His Kingdom. We covetyour prayers and support knowing that we are insufficient and He is all sufficient.

We sincerely thank the men who have given of their time and talents during 2017. Every month gospel seeds are being planted and watered - and we know the Lord is faithful and will provide the increase.

Volunteers for 2018 are needed. If you would like to serve but cannot commit to attending every quarter, your attendance would be welcomed whenever your Saturday evening schedule allows. This is an ideal way for Liberty's men – whether teenage, middle age or AARP age – to connect with each other and advance God's kingdom. No one is ever required to speak unless they want to and transportation is always provided from the church. Serving Local, National and Foreign Missions

We also praise God for His provisions and thank the congregation for their support of the missions program at Liberty. Please continue to pray for our Missionaries, and the Missions program at Liberty.



The Stockaders look forward to crafting their rockets and shape and race cars and competing in our church and regional competitions. We would appreciate your support by attending our race and perhaps volunteering as a shape judge. We are very thankful that so many boys and their Dads are participating in Stockade this year.

Battalion was lead in January by Nick Hathaway assisted by 3 Lieutenants. In October, with the departure of Nick

Hathaway, the Captain duty was assumed by Karl Johnsson for the balance of the year. The battalion had 7 active guys during the 2017 year. The Battalion activities are planned to instill leadership qualities.

The highlight this spring was Camp-O-Rama at Camp Hemlock where the boys came in second place in overall competition. Also, a campout and Bike Ride on the C&O tow path to DC from Marsden Tract. This fall it was a Campout and short Backpack Hike on the church property. Study subjects for the weekly meetings have included "how to instruction" in; getting a first job, studying, bible study and leading a bible study, grilling, Backpacking and financial management. The Battalion also was able to send the Sergeant and one Lieutenant to Leadership training at Camp Hemlock in September. The Battalion participates in service projects.

God instructs believing men to train and build up their sons in the Lord through many different means. CSB is a means towards that end. The boys, young men and leaders of CSB are thankful for your support.



OPEN HEARTS MINISTRY

Serving others in foster care, adoption, and vulnerable families

God blessed the Open Hearts ministry this year by the Church serving children and families in foster care in Carroll and Baltimore Counties. In March 2017, we set up an information board to share ways the congregation can volunteer in the community through Safe Families, CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates), Baltimore and Carroll County Departments of Social Services, as well as sponsorship opportunities with Compassion International. In May 2017, Erin Tracht attended the Christian Alliance for Orphans conference, where organizations and ministries from across the nation and world came together to discuss how to encourage the Church to answer the call to serve orphans. Later in May, the artists of Liberty Church designed duffle bags for children who initially come into foster care in Baltimore County. Others donated items to fill the duffle bags, such as pajamas, stuffed animals, and toiletries. In July, many donated furniture and toys to refresh the children's waiting room at Baltimore County Circuit Court (where children in care wait sometimes many hours to see the Judge for their court hearings). We deep cleaned and put up stencils to make the room more inviting. For Orphan Sunday on November 12h, we had an awareness presen-



Looking forward into 2018, Open Hearts hopes to continue raising awareness of the dire need for vulnerable families and for children in the foster care system. We hope to continue to work with Safe Families to train members of the congregation in the many roles within their program. We also hope to bless the Carroll County Department of Social Services by creating wall art and donating furniture to refresh their visitation room (where children have visits with their biological families at DSS). To address the risk of children being placed into the system, we hope to complete the "Blessings Closet", using a space under the stairs to the Old Sanctuary. We have already collected clothing and toys that we can use for families in need; we want to the Blessings Closet to work similarly to how the Food Pantry at Liberty works. We plan to collaborate with the Mercy Needs committee for this purpose. Open Hearts hopes to also work with the youth group to plan a Parents Night Out event, where the teens provide childcare so parents can enjoy a night out to reconnect, and encourage strengthening marriages.

We are blessed by the outpouring of support for this ministry and know that the Holy Spirit is working in the hearts of our church body, to love as God has called us to love.
