LETTER FROM THE PASTOR

Pastor's Views

End of year report for 2022, Liberty Church PCA TE Van Devender, Interim Pastor

State of Our Church:

In contrast to 2021, 2022 was a time of relative stability and healing within our community. There were certainly some interesting patches with a few particular concerns that surfaced, but on the whole, LCPCA took those things in stride and continued to keep "the main thing the main thing."

Our worship service continues to be strong and well-attended. Our elders are working well together and are certainly sincere and dedicated servants as evidenced by their role in leading worship. RE Phil Lambooy has completed his first year on the session and has proven very useful in filling the pulpit on occasion.

Our finances are stable, and the Lord has blessed us with sufficient funds for some work on the church and a few new initiatives. Our staff are dedicated servants who take their work seriously and go above and beyond their job descriptions in order to do "what has to be done" when necessary. Along those lines, Dianna Cote has joined our staff this year in her capacity as supervising the new purchase order system that we put in place this year (thanks to James Hoff, Sarah Crowe and Dave Tracht in particular) and, so far, has proven to help us keep the credit card purchase and receipts together.

Spiritually, the church is continuing the climb out of the Covid lock-down hole that hit us back in 2020. We began last year to get our SS and bible studies and worship service on a better track and, praise the Lord, that has continued and even accelerated a bit. Several initiatives have been put in place to ease some of the points of friction (see below) and also to move into a more vital spiritual community. We are hoping to implement a "mentoring" program for developing spiritual leaders in the New Year and the Session will be holding a spiritual retreat in Feb. 2023 to build unity and focus on how to build up our church's witness in the coming years. On the whole, LCPCA has continued its history of being a solid, confessional, worshiping community in 2022 and we have every reason to expect God's blessings in 2023. I think it was a significant indicator of "getting back to normal" that we held our first VBS program since 2013 this past Summer. I was very impressed at the work and enthusiasm of all who participated in this huge undertaking.

A brief summary of 2022 from a pastoral perspective. Brief Overview:

2022 was a very busy year! From my own personal perspective, there was a fairly significant increase in what I would call "pastoral counseling" as members got used to me being around and began to seek out conversations (and I initiated some myself). This was good and necessary because such interactions are essential to know the community in order to lead and preach to it.

Our congregational family also encountered times of joy and sadness. We had infant baptisms (Crowe) and a covenant wedding. (Chilton) We shed tender tears when we lost <u>Val Thomas and Rose Hoffman</u> and with members of our family who lost loved ones <u>(Smiths, Knotts, Bohmer)</u>. On a personal note, I lost dearly beloved brothers in Christ also and was

called to minister at their funeral and interment services in addition to ours here.

We were saddened by the discipline case that arose in our midst and wept at the lack of repentance for the overt sin that occasioned it. The Session spent untold hours dealing with this issue which, necessarily, was not often visible to the congregation. However, the Church did its Biblical duty and we expect the Lord's blessing on our faithfulness in this as in all things.

Liberty Christian School

2022 continued the upward trend of improved working relations with our major ministry. I participated in many of the LCS functions such as New Teacher Orientation, Graduation Ceremony, Pastor Appreciation Day, and class monitoring, etc. Several of the elders also visited the classrooms and were encouraged by the experience.

I consistently met with the Head of School, Marcia Antoine, on a bi-weekly basis to discuss progress in relations as well as challenges that might occur. I interviewed all of the proposed new hires to ensure a viable Christian testimony as well as how each would "fit" within our joint educational priorities for the school.

We started a joint steering committee consisting of a facilitator (me), the Head of the School, a school board member, and two elders. This committee met regularly over the Summer and proposed several initiatives (such as joint session/board meetings) which were acted on with good results.

The school and the church together weathered a somewhat tense situation when a very public issue arose regarding a man who had taught at the school several years ago. He was found guilty of child abuse and the authorities were very intent to discover if there were any questions about his time here (again, several years ago). This occasioned a "town hall" zoom meeting with the student's parents that I attended. Their questions were answered and strong leadership from the school and the board did much to stabilize what could have been a problem.

We look forward to furthering improved relations with LCS and every member of our congregation has just reason to be proud of the ministry happening there. This next year our current Head of School will be retiring and we, church and school together, will miss her leadership even as we cooperate together to find a qualified and zealous replacement.

The Wider Church

Your elders participated regularly in Presbytery meetings this past year. RE Madden has also served on the important Leadership Development Committee which screens candidates for ministry. He and I attended the General Assembly in Birmingham, AL where I served on the Overtures Committee, the most challenging and time-consuming committee in the Assembly.

I further continued to serve on our Presbytery Judicial Commission which dealt with several judicial issues over the course of the year. Again, this is a time-consuming task.

The "Almost but Not Yet" Search for a Senior Pastor.

Perhaps the issue with the greatest possibility of discouragement transpired in October when we had a highly qualified candidate who appeared to be an answer to our prayers. In God's providence, it did not work out because he perceived that his ministry skills did not fit with our Church. His somewhat abrupt change of mind was difficult for us, but we put our church and our lives in God's hands and did exactly what we had to do: we saw this as God's way of preserving and protecting both the candidate and us.

Satan may very well have meant it for evil, but God used it for good, and so we, and our pastoral search committee is continuing our journey, undiscouraged and undaunted.

Conclusion:

As I said, 2022 was a very busy year. There are a lot of moving parts at Liberty Church and many ministry efforts happen "under the radar." I may have failed to mention some particular ministry or occasion that should have been included but I plead for grace

and forgiveness if such is true._Scanning my calendar over the past 12 months, these are the things that stood out to me. Most importantly, I simply wish to encourage us all to a deeper, more joyful, reliance upon the goodness of our God through Jesus Christ. Liberty Church is much beloved by Him, and it is a blessing to serve alongside you all as we follow His Spirit into Liberty's future.

As in years past the Session met over 30 times in 2022, formally, as well as informal meetings, striving to provide shepherding leadership of the flock at Liberty. We also strived to be present at Presbytery meetings as well as Pastor Arch and Steve Madden attending General Assembly in Alabama.

We, the Session, will continue to pray for the Body and as the Lord leads guide our church to grow in God's grace.

OPEN HEARTS MINISTRY

Open Hearts Ministry- Serving Foster Families and Vulnerable Children The Open Hearts ministry continued to grow the areas of services in 2022, again with increased need for tangible items from the Blessings Closet.

- In January, we began hosting Foster the Family support groups, which meets monthly for prospective & current foster, kinship and adoptive moms. We also provide childcare during the support group so moms can get a break and build community. Many volunteers served through set-up & clean-up, providing snacks, and providing childcare each month. The plan is to continue to host monthly meetings throughout next year as well.
- After each support group, we invite each mom to "shop" in the Blessings Closet as they may have a new child in their care, or need to switch out sizes/seasons of clothing. Open Hearts was able to provide furniture, bedding, baby equipment, and other resources to foster families when they welcomed a child into their home.
- We were able to provide two new Foster the Family support group locations (Catonsville & Bel Air) with clothing, shoe, and baby equipment donations as their host churches also established Blessings Closets.
- Praise God for being able to serve at The Children's Home since May 2018. When the campus was shut down during
 COVID-19, visitors were not allowed on campus. The Bible Study leaders began meeting with the girls every other week,
 back in person since October 2021 (after needing to meet virtually for over a year due to COVID. Praise the Lord!. We
 share topically about God, Jesus, sin, forgiveness, grace, and share our testimonies. In December, the girls were blessed
 with Christmas gift bags of necessities, treats and gift cards, while learning about the greatest gift of all, Jesus.
- We gave donations of formula, diapers, wipes, baby equipment and clothing to Alpha Pregnancy Center multiple times throughout the year.
- Donations of adult clothing and shoes were sent to the Westminster Rescue Mission.
- In December, members of the congregation donated to girls in the Diagnostic Unit as well as the stockroom necessities for Foster the Family Baltimore. Donations of board games were collected for family gifts and socks and toiletries were collected for the girls. Thank you again for the support of this ministry!

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

We praise God for the faithful giving of the Lord's people. As members of the FMC, we see those monies given by the congregation as a form of worship to our Lord and always try to keep this truth in the forefront of our work for Him. The final reports for 2022 are still to be completed, with reconciliation of all accounts being done in early January of next year. The final reports will be distributed to the congregational sometime before the planned congregational meeting in late January 2022.

For the most part 2022 has been a year of a decrease in our overall budgeted expenses coupled with a slight decrease in tithes and offerings as of the date of this report. The church received forgiven funds through the PPP2 program through the application initiated by Liberty Christian School of approximately \$44,000.00. Additionally, other income was received via the sale of stock and memorial giving. So in light of these as well as reduced expenses the church should finish 2022 in a strong financial position.

The church is also undergoing a financial audit for fiscal year 2021. Audits are usually planned for every four years. We are behind schedule with regards to this due to delays from Covid. The results from this audit should be completed early in 2023.

There is much that takes place behind the scenes which makes up the ministry of caring for funds given in the Lord's name and given as a form of worship to Him. From the ushers who collect the offerings, to the counting teams, to the treasurer and committee members, to those who track each members giving and issue statements, all these parts play a critical role in the faithful administration of the Lord's funds. As chairperson, I am humbled by what I see and am so thankful that I am supported by such a wonderful group of brothers and sisters in Christ.

NURSERY AND CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

Children's Sunday School

2022 has been another strong year for Children's Sunday School. The five age groups include Toddlers (2-3 year olds), Pre-K through 1st Grade, 2nd & 3rd Grade, 4th & 5th Grade, and Youth (middle & high school). All classes have continued using Answers Bible Curriculum from Answers in Genesis. This curriculum adapts concepts to each developmental age group allowing us to synchronize the lesson topics being taught across all classes. This allows families with children in multiple age groups to easily follow up at home on the lesson topics that are taught each week in Sunday School. This year we have had about 25-30 children attending Sunday School across all of the age groups.

Our teachers this year include: Amy Huey, Bri Luff, Peggy Walker, Carol Byrd, Sarah Eckles, Emily Eckles, Mary Jordan, Natalie Klein, Shawn Huey, Andy Byrd, Stuart Luff, and Brendon Lee.

Wonders of Worship

Wonders of Worship (W.O.W.) has been a blessing to all involved this year! We are using the New City Catechism curriculum which is adapted from the Calvin's Geneva Catechism, the Westminster Shorter and Larger catechisms, and the Heidelberg Catechism. This curriculum takes complex biblical and doctrinal concepts and teaches them at an accessible level for the children in WOW (4 year olds-2nd grade). This 52 week curriculum includes three parts:

Part 1: God, creation and fall, law

Part 2: Christ, redemption, grace

Part 3: Spirit, restoration, growing in grace

Each week we are blessed to have about 8-10 children in WOW.

Our teachers for WOW include: Liz Davidson, Natalie Klein, Kaiah Chilton, Carol Rose, Candice Walker, Hannah Watkins, Anthony Anderson, Bri Luff, and Caroline Luff

Nursery

Our Nursery continues to serve families with young children 1 through 3 years old during our services and we want to thank all those who have volunteered over this past year to make this possible. We also hope to reestablish the infant nursery in 2023 to serve families with children younger than a year.

Vacation Bible School

This year Liberty held the first Vacation Bible School since 2013. It was a huge success, bringing in over 30 volunteers and over 60 kids from our church, Liberty Christian School, and the local community. The themed focus was "Zoomerang: Returning the Value to Life" from Answers in Genesis. Throughout the week the children "traveled" to different parts of Australia and marveled at the unforgettable wildlife, culture, and beauty of Australia while discovering that from the tiniest to the oldest, each person is made in the image of God—wonderfully designed to know Him and live for Him!

In the Summer of 2023, we plan to hold VBS with the Answers in Genesis theme "Keepers of the Kingdom: Standing Strong in Today's Battle for Truth".

Liberty Church currently supports 28 individual missionaries/ministries

11 foreign, 17 local, domestic

Now that many of the Covid restrictions have been lifted, we were able to have 3 Missions Sundays, where the missionaries share during the Sunday School hour, and one church wide mission luncheon and speaker.

Each week we include special prayer requests in the bulletin from the various missionaries and ministries.

Several members of the committee took lunch to the RUFI students at Johns Hopkins University in the spring and fall.

The Mission house has been a real blessing to missionaries who are on home assignment and we were able to host the Cox family during the summer and fall of this year.

The Missions Committee and the missionaries that Liberty supports continue to covet prayers for wisdom and guidance as we all seek to be good stewards of God's abundant blessings.

LIBERTY CHRISTIAN SCHOOL

The Mission of Liberty Christian School is: Partnering with Christian parents to provide our children with a quality, Christ-centered education. This past year we continue to be blessed by the Lord in many ways. Some of the many ways we have been blessed are:

- We continue to grow, our enrollment for the 2022/23 school year increased by 14 students, an increase of 9% over the 2021/22 school year. We now have 14 more students to share the Gospel with and provide them with a quality Christ-centered education.
- The COVID years impacted many of our programs. We had to discontinue our elective subjects, Summer Camp and the before school and after school programs. This school year has been the first that we have most of these programs back in place.
- We have increased our activity in the community. During the year we held Trunk or Treat, the Spring Auction, Pastor Appreciation Breakfast / Chapel, and Fall and Spring Festivals. The school is becoming more involved in the community not just to encourage more interest in the school but also to bring people together in our community. This is another way the school is involved in spreading the Gospel in our community
- COVID stopped all of our interscholastic sports programs. This fall we were able to have interscholastic basketball and cheerleading. We are planning to bring back a soccer program next fall.
- In May our Robotics team, the Robo-Lions, competed in the Robotics World Championships in Dallas, Texas. This was a great achievement by the Robotics team to be one of the few teams from Maryland to compete in the World Championships. It was a great experience for our kids to meet and compete with kids from around the world.
- During the 2021/22 school year the eighth-grade was not able, due to COVID restrictions, to take their mission trip to Costa Rica. This year's class was able to take a mission trip to Porta Rica. This was the schools first trip to Porta Rica and the class worked with Youth With a Mission to clean up a school, do some painting and landscaping and work with local kids. This trip was a great opportunity for our students see another country and to serve God in a different environment.
- This year we have a part-time School Counselor. This is not a Guidance Counselor but a counselor that helps children and parents with problems they are having in their lives. COVID had a great impact on learning and relationships, so returning to school has been difficult for some children. A counselor has been a blessing because he or she can sit with a child and share God's love with them and help them through difficult times. Please pray for these children, they missed so much, both relationally and educationally when they were not physically in school.

God continues to bless us to keep the school in a stable financial position.

Liberty Christian School has been a light to the community for 42 years and there have been many lives enriched and changed through God working in the ministry of LCS. We thank Liberty Church for their support and assistance without which there would not be a school. We welcome anyone who would like to volunteer at the school or come and visit the school.
